What do you need to graduate from a Catholic Secondary School?

30 credits

Students are expected to take a Religious Studies credit in each grade:

4 credits in Religious Studies

Students must earn the following compulsory credits to obtain the Ontario Secondary School Diploma:

4 credits in English* (one per grade)

3 credits in mathematics (one senior credit)

2 credits in science

1 credit in Canadian history

1 credit in Canadian geography

1 credit in the arts

1 credit in health and physical education

1 credit in French as a second language

0.5 credit in career studies

0.5 credit in civics

Plus one credit from each of the following groups:

1 additional credit in English or French as a second language, or a Native language, or a classical or an international language, or social sciences and the humanities, or Canadian and world studies[†], or guidance and career education or cooperative education^{**} [†] Grade 11 Religious Studies meets this requirement!

1 additional credit in senior science, technological education computer studies, or French as a second language (Grades 9 - 12), or cooperative education^{**}

1 additional credit in health and physical education or the arts, or business studies, or cooperative education^{**}, or French as a second language

In addition to the compulsory credits, students must complete:

8 optional credits^{***}

+ 40 hours of Christian Service

+ the provincial literacy requirement

+ at least two online learning credits

*A maximum of 3 credits in English as a second language (ESL) or English literacy development (ELD) may be counted towards the 4 compulsory credits in English, but the fourth must be a credit earned for a Grade 12 compulsory English course. **A maximum of 2 credits in cooperative education can count as compulsory credits. ***May include up to four credits achieved through approved Dual Credit courses.

Success For All Students

THE GRADE 9 SECONDARY SCHOOL PROGRAM

All Grade 9 courses are one-credit courses requiring a minimum of 110 hours of scheduled time. Grade 9 courses are offered at the following levels: **Academic (D)**, **Destreamed (W)**, **Locally Developed (L)** and **Open (O)**. The expectation is that students take one Religious Education (at the open level) course per year while at Bishop Ryan.

LEVELS OF COURSES IN GRADES 9

ACADEMIC COURSES “D” and DESTREAMED COURSES “W”

These courses focus on the essential concepts of the discipline plus additional related concepts. They develop a student’s knowledge and skills by emphasizing the theoretical, abstract applications while incorporating practical applications. Upon completion of any Academic or Destreamed course, your teacher will recommend the appropriate level for Grade 10. Grade 9s in Academic or Destreamed courses will learn to:

- ✓ Work independently and collaboratively
- ✓ Think creatively and enjoy problem-solving
- ✓ Develop ideas from research
- ✓ Demonstrate strong motivation
- ✓ Complete one or more hours of homework each night
- ✓ Display good work habits

LOCALLY DEVELOPED COURSES “L”

These courses have been modified to meet the individual needs of students while challenging them to improve their learning and achievement in the literacy, numeracy, and scientific areas. They lead to workplace stream courses in Grades 11 and 12. Grade 9 students in Locally Developed Courses:

- ✓ Benefit from additional reinforcement of concepts
- ✓ Received modifications in the regular Gr 8 program
- ✓ Learn by Doing
- ✓ Are successful with the practical applications

OPEN COURSES “O”

Open courses have one set of expectations that are appropriate for all students. These courses are designed to provide students with a broad base that will help prepare them for their role in society. They are not linked to any specific post-secondary destination.

ESL COURSES (6th character “L”)

These courses are specifically designed to meet the learning needs of English Language Learners.

UNDERSTANDING COURSE CODING

High School Courses use a **6-character Course Code**. The first 5 characters of the Course Code come from the Ministry of Education. The 6th character is used by schools to indicate the number of credits a course is worth, or to indicate that a course falls within a specialized program. **Take a look at the example below to understand your course codes.**

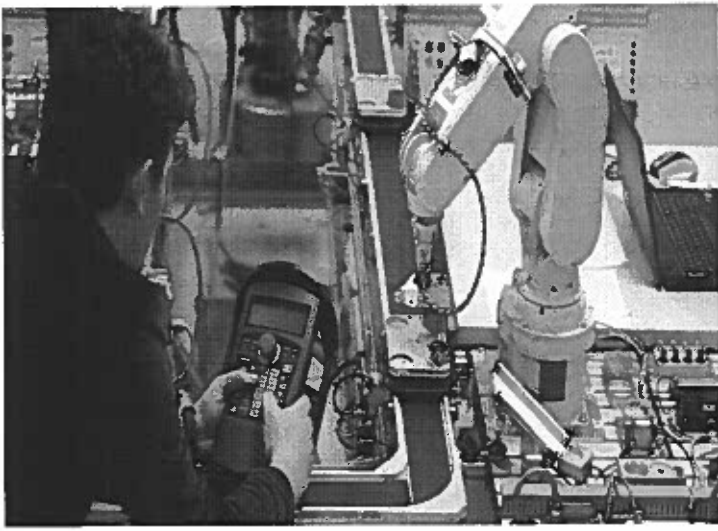

The first three letters indicate the subject area:
 A = Art B = Business C = Canadian & World Studies
 E = English F = French G = Guidance & Career Education
 H = Humanities M = Mathematics L = International Languages
 S = Science T = Technology P = Physical Education

This number identifies the Grade:
 1 = Grade 9 2 = Grade 10 3 = Grade 11 4 = Grade 12

This letter identifies the level of the course:
 D = Academic P = Applied O = Open L = Locally Developed W = Destreamed

The sixth character is for school use and indicates the credit value of the course or a course within a specialized program:
 1 = credit value of one C = Co-op E = E-learning
 L = the course is appropriate for English Language Learners

Advanced Automation/Manufacturing (AAM) is an Early College Graduation Program offered exclusively at Bishop Ryan Catholic Secondary School (BR) in Hamilton, in collaboration with Mohawk College.

Over approximately 4.5 years, students earn their Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD), a one-year Ontario College Certificate in Advanced Manufacturing Operations, and the Manufacturing Skills Standards Council (MSSC) Certified Production Technician certification. Students will be ready to begin a career (or continue further post-secondary studies) by the time they graduate.

While in the AAM program students will:

- take regular high school courses required to earn their OSSD,
- take dual credit courses with a Mohawk College instructor and high school teacher required to earn a college certificate,
- participate in real work experiences with industry partners, including exploring various careers through internship, coaching and mentoring.

...all at no cost to the student!

Who is Eligible for AAM?

BR's AAM program is primarily intended for interested and motivated students coming into Grade 9 from BR's Family of Schools, however, other incoming Grade 9 students will be eligible.

AAM students are expected to be:

- interested in technology
- eager to learn the skills needed to succeed in technology industries
- committed to a strong attendance record, as evidenced in elementary school
- curious, dedicated hands-on learners ready to take on the challenges of school, college, work and life
- excited to participate in potential extended day and/or summer programs

What Career Pathways Await AAM Students?

AAM students will be prepared to begin a career in the Advanced Automation and Manufacturing in a range of exciting and competitive specialty areas. Through the full program, students will have the opportunity to develop skills in focus areas including:

- Process Control & Monitoring
- Industrial Automation & Robotics
- Industrial Internet of Things (IIoT)
- Lean Manufacturing
- Digital Literacy/Data Analytics
- Manufacturing Processes
- Autonomous Maintenance
- Programmable Logic Controller (PLC)
- Human Machine Interface (HMI)
- Green Production and Environmental Sustainability

REGISTRATION PROCESS FOR HWCDSB STUDENTS

1. Notify your Elementary School that you are coming to Bishop Ryan. Your name will then be transferred to us.
2. Complete the Registration Forms provided by Elementary School (updating all personal information)
3. Pay \$55 Activity Fee on School Cash On Line. This Activity Fee includes a mandatory school issued lock.
4. Select, review, and submit your 8 courses using My Blueprint on MySite.
5. Submit the Completed Package January 19th, 2023
 - ✓ Registration Form
 - ✓ Print out of course selections must be signed by parent/guardian
 - ✓ \$55.00 Activity Fee: Cash or a receipt of payment made through Cash on-Line.
6. Get Access to your Timetable and locker # in late June on ASPEN.

REGISTRATION PROCESS FOR IN BOUNDS NON FEEDER

- Once you receive this email a) please call the school to book your intake meeting (both parent/guardian and student must attend) or b) you may be required to complete a parental review

- ✓ Immigration Information/Proof of Status in Canada
- ✓ Birth Certificate
- ✓ Most recent Report Card/Transcript
- ✓ Proof of residency (Utility bill)
- ✓ \$55.00 Activity Fee (includes the cost of your mandatory school-issued lock)
- ✓ Individual Education Plan (if applicable)
- ✓ Court Order: Custody Provisions (if applicable)

1) **LOGIN** to MySite and click the blue M icon called MY BLUEPRINT



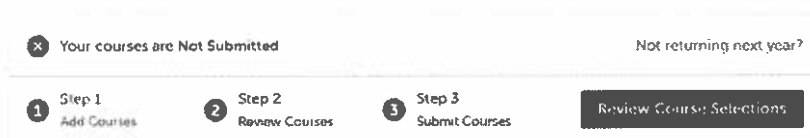
2) **COURSE SELECTION- 3 STEPS**

From your **Dashboard**, choose *High School* from the left hand navigation menu.



STEP 1: ADD COURSES FOR NEXT YEAR:

In High School Planner, click + [Course]. In the **Course Selection and Details** screen, explore the available courses. Please ensure you have the pre-requisite if one is required. Click **Add Course** when you find the course you want.



HINT: The *Graduation Indicator* will help you keep track of your progress towards graduation. Click **View Progress** for a list of specific graduation requirements.

STEP 2: REVIEW COURSES: When you are ready to submit your course selections, click the blue **Review Course Selections** button and give your course selection one final look over.

NOTE: Please use the "Add Comments" section to explain any issues to your guidance counsellor (i.e. taking the prerequisite in summer school)

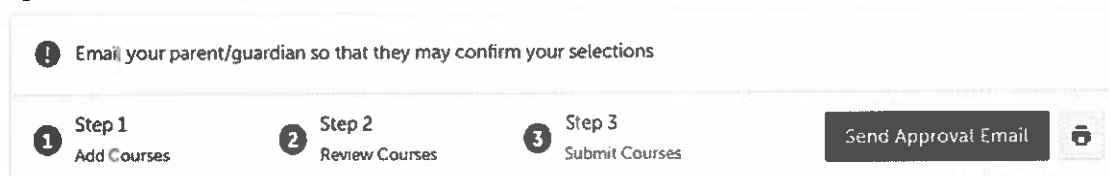


STEP 3: SUBMIT COURSES



Carefully review the **Details** page to ensure that you are meeting the requirements for the courses you have selected and that the courses that appear are correct. THEN CLICK on **SUBMIT COURSE SELECTIONS**. Please note that you will not be able to modify your course selections once submitted (unless your guidance counsellor re-allows submission)!

3) **PRINT SIGN-OFF SHEET:** After submitting your course selections, Click the **Printer** button at the top right and return a signed copy by your parent/guardian to your school.



NOTE: You can also access the sign-off sheet from the **High School planner** – if it doesn't show after you've clicked the **Printer** button next to the **Resend Approval Email** button, check the pop-up blocker settings for your web browser.

Frequently Asked Questions

1. How many courses must a student take in Grade 9?

Students must take 8 courses. Grade 9 students take 6 core courses (compulsory) and 2 electives.

2. What is De-Streamed Math and Science?

As we transition to a de-streamed Grade 9 Science and Math program, the ministry will be exploring ways to collaborate with education partners and others to support a smooth transition for students and schools. All students, regardless of scientific or mathematic achievement will be in the same Grade 9 Math course: MTH1W1 and same Grade 9 Science Class: SNC1W1.

3. Grade 9 Core courses (English, Geography and French) are offered in different levels- Academic and Locally Developed or Open. What should be considered before choosing?

The student's level of achievement in grade 8 and your son/daughters' work habits and learning skills.

4. Can a student try out a subject at one level of difficulty and switch to another level of difficulty during the semester if the course is too difficult or too easy?

Changing streams within a semester is possible. Timetable changes occur within first 10 days (If possible).

5. Can a student choose a mix of Academic, Open, and Locally Developed courses, depending on his/her unique academic abilities?

Absolutely. Students should choose courses based on their academic abilities and interests.

6. Can a student who is successful in one stream in Grade 9 switch to another in Grade 10?

Yes. Speak to your Guidance Counsellor for details.

7. When do parents and the student begin to make decisions with career destinations in mind?

In Grade 11, course streams are based on post-secondary destination (University, College, Workplace). These decisions will be made in grade 10 typically after your son/daughter takes Career Studies (GLC2O9). All grade 10 students are required to take this course where they will explore many different career paths and post-secondary destinations.

8. When will I get uniform Info?

At this time, we recommend that you register with McCarthy Uniforms at www.mccarthyuniforms.ca and prepare to shop for school uniforms in the late Spring/Summer.

9. Can I come and find my classes ahead of time?

Yes! In late August there will be a Grade 8 Day and Grade 8 Passport to Success where you can tour the school, find your locker, and meet new people.

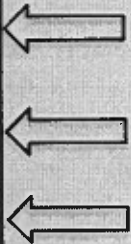

- 1 **Who works in Student Services?**

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Accommodations: Depending on the needs of the student, accommodations may be made to the learning environment to enable students to achieve the learning expectations

Compulsory Courses: A course which must be passed in order to complete the requirements of Ontario Secondary School Diploma

Cooperative Education: is a structured method of combining classroom-based education with practical work experience. A cooperative education experience, commonly known as a "co-op", provides academic credit for structured job experience. Cooperative education is taking on new importance in helping young people to make the school-to-work transition.

English as a Second Language: ESL Courses are intended to help students develop language proficiency. A student in Ontario Secondary school at any grade may be given a credit for a maximum of 3 ESL credits towards the 4 Compulsory English credits required for a OSSD.

Exceptional Pupil: A student whose behavioural, communicational, intellectual, physical multiple exceptionalities are such that he/she needs placement in a Special Education Program by the Identification, Placement and Review Committee. This student often has an IEP.

Demonstration of Learning (DOL) Grade 9 and 10 Applied and Open courses in certain Departments- students are eligible to complete the course without writing the final exam if the following criteria is met: overall grade of 70% or higher, less than 8 absences (or 4 for .5 credits), all assignments and tests submitted, no suspensions.

Elective Courses: Optional courses are those selected by a student in the domain of their choice. Students must earn 12 optional credits.

Individual Pathway Plan (IPP): Beginning in grade 7, Students will document their learning in education and career planning via Career Cruising. The IPP is a primary planning tool for students as they move through grades

Modifications: Students may need to have curriculum expectations modified in keeping with their specific needs

O.S.S.D: Ontario Secondary School Diploma is awarded to a student who completes 30 credits: 18 Compulsory and 12 Elective Credits, minimum 40 Hours of community service and passing of the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test.

Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP) The Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP) is a School to Work program that opens the door for students to explore and work in apprenticeship occupations starting in Grade 11 or Grade 12 through the Cooperative Education program. Students have an opportunity to become registered apprentices and work towards becoming certified journeypersons in a skilled trade while completing their secondary school diplomas.

Prerequisite Course: A course that is deemed absolutely essential for the successful understanding and completion of a subsequent course. Prerequisite courses are established only by Ministry curriculum policy documents.

Semester: Refers to the organization of the school year into two complete segments where students take 4 courses per semester. Semester One; September to January followed by exams. Semester 2: February- June followed by Final exams.

Specialist High Skills Major: An SHSM is a ministry-approved specialized program that allows students to focus their learning on a specific economic sector while meeting the requirements to graduate from secondary school. It also assists in their transition after graduation to apprenticeship training, college, university or the workplace. Students graduate with a red seal on their diploma as well as other valuable certificates (i.e CPR/First Aid). SHSM would include a 2 credit cooperative education experience typically in grade 11.

Transcript: The Ontario Student Transcript is a cumulative and continuous record of a student's completion and attempts of credits and diploma requirements.

Grade 9 Summer Math Camp

Bishop Ryan C.S.S.

This program provides 15 hours of instruction, focusing on key concepts of the grade 9 math curriculum for all students entering high school in 2023

- Camp will prepare students for the revised Grade 9 Ontario math curriculum
- Course is available to students in-person or virtual through Microsoft Teams
- Program aims to bridge the transition for students entering high school
- Courseware and valuable resources will be provided
- Enrollment is limited – class reaches capacity every year
